Course Description

This course builds upon the material learned in Ear Training 1, and introduces new concepts related to singing and transcribing rhythms, melodies, and harmonic progressions from common-practice Western popular music. Some of the new concepts touched upon in this course include modality, chromaticism, triplets, and various elements of by-ear song analysis.

By the end of the term, students should demonstrate a significant improvement upon their aural skills at the beginning of the semester. This improvement should be evident across all facets of the course.

Grading

Your grade depends solely on your individual performance. You will not be evaluated against your colleagues. The following will improve your grade: meeting deadlines, scholarly effort, and demonstrating curiosity and interest in the course material. The instructor reserves the right to alter any grade based on class conduct, and reserves the right to fail any student for consistent class disruption; they will be issued one warning and upon later infraction will be failed. The classroom is a positive, supportive, and inclusive learning environment for all students.

Your grade will be calculated as follows:

Weekly Assignments: 60% (12 at 5% each) Final Projects: 30% (2 at 15% each)

In-Class Activities: 10%

Twice throughout the semester, I will hold meetings with students individually. During these meetings, students will perform that week's assignment for me in person, in a one-on-one setting. We will also discuss students' progress and any issues they might be having with the course material. **These meetings will take the places of Assignments 4 and 10.** Your attendance at these two one-on-one meetings is **mandatory**. If we move to remote learning during these times, these meetings will be held on Zoom.

Submitting Assignments

I ask that you submit your assignments by email to EarTrainingAssignments@gmail.com. If your attachments are too large, feel free to submit a link to the files through Dropbox, OneDrive, or another file-sharing service.

Many of the assignments will require you to submit recordings of yourself singing. These recordings can be done in whatever way works best for you (computer, phone, tablet, other recording device, etc.). If you do not have a way to record yourself, please let me know right away and we will work out an alternative way for you to submit your assignments.

Other parts of your assignment will require you to transcribe melodies onto staff paper. I will provide you with a staff on the assignment for those of you who can print it. Alternatively, you can transcribe the melodies by hand on staff paper and send me a **clear and legible** image or scan via email. If you do not have access to staff paper or would prefer to do it electronically, you can use a notation software or website. One example is www.noteflight.com, which allows you to notate your transcription on a staff, and then share it with me via a link. You can do this with a free membership.

Attendance in the Time of COVID

While attending class will help you succeed in this course and your participation in-class will improve your final grade, if you have been exposed to or have symptoms of COVID-19, I ask that you please let me know by email and stay home until you have tested negative and no longer have symptoms. You can still submit your work from home, and you will not be penalized for missing any class meetings. A certain degree of independence will be necessary on your part, however: you will have to keep up-to-date on your work, and if you have questions or need any help, you will have to take initiative and reach out to me by email. I am happy to set up Zoom meetings with students in these situations.

Procedures if Moved to Remote Learning

In the unlikely event that our course is moved to remote learning, we will meet during class time (M/W 11:00–12:15pm) on Zoom. During these meetings, we will go over course material and discuss new concepts. Assignment deadlines will remain the same.
