Course Information:

Course Overview & Goals: Music surrounds us, whether we are listening to our favorite playlist to unwind, watching performers on the subway, or attending a live concert. This class offers instruction in how to interact with, and better understand music; asking "what does music do and why should we care?" By the end of the course, you will have developed an understanding of the basic principles of musical organization (content, form, style), be familiar with selected pieces of European Classical, World, and Popular music, and be able to engage with music in a new, critical way.

Weekly Readings & Listenings: Most of our readings will come from Esther M. Morgan-Ellis' Resonances: Engaging Music in its Cultural Context. I will post each assigned reading in the corresponding "Course Materials" Blackboard folder, along with corresponding YouTube links for accompanying listenings. Discussion Posts: I will post 3 prompt questions on the Blackboard Discussion section when a discussion post is assigned. Please choose 1 prompt to answer in up to 200 words. There will be 7 assigned discussion posts, and 1 extra credit/make up discussion post during our film music unit. The grading for these discussion board posts will be submission-based (AKA, if you submit your assignment on time, you will receive full credit), and are worth 10 points each. Discussion posts are due Monday before class. If you submit your discussion post past the deadline, you will receive half credit.

Quizzes: We will have 4 quizzes this semester, each worth 10 points. They will be in-class quizzes (often scheduled on Wednesdays) and will be due by the end of class. If you are absent when a listening quiz is assigned, you may make up the quiz virtually during office hours.

Midterm Showcase Presentations: You will sign up for 1 Wednesday class day where you will bring in a piece (show and tell style) relating to the topic discussed in class. This is a group project, and you will be working alongside other members of class on your chosen topic. Each student in the group will prepare a short presentation on how their piece relates to our topic. We will sign up for topics the second week of class- I want to be sure each student is presenting on a topic that interests them.

Final Project (Music and.... Playlist): A playlist of six pieces aligned with a social topic of your choosing (like Music and Feminism, Music and Mourning, etc.). Not eligible: topics in the textbook chapter titles, emotions, or moods. Each piece will feature a written "playlist entry" of about 200-250 words. Playlist choices should include a diversity of genres and styles. You will submit a topic proposal on April 4, 2021, and soon after receive feedback from Prof. Schindele before continuing the final project. Your final project is due Friday, May 20, 2021, at 11:59 PM EST.


