Course Information:

Course Description & Learning Objectives: Music surrounds us, whether we are listening to our favorite playlist to unwind, watching performers on the subway, or attending a live concert. This class offers instruction on how to interact with, and better understand music; asking "what does music *do* and why should we *care*?" By the end of the course, you will have developed an understanding of the basic principles of musical organization (content, form, style), be familiar with selected pieces of European Classical, World, and Popular music, and be able to engage with music in a new, critical way.

Course Modality: This fall semester of MUSIC 1 will be taught fully in person on Mondays and Wednesdays from 10:45AM-12:00PM in room Music 265 (Aron Copland building).

Readings & Listenings: Please refer to the "course schedule" for the schedule of lecture topics and readings due each week. This course is made of Open Educational Resources (OER), which are entirely cost-free and accessible online, meaning all required readings will be provided free of charge through the Commons site. The two core texts we will be looking at this semester are Morgan-Ellis' *Resonances*, and Clark et. al's *Understanding Music: Past and Present*, both which are entirely cost-free with links provided in the course schedule and on the Commons site under "Resources." Also under the "Resources" tab, you will find a document that includes the links to your weekly listenings.

Reflection Posts: We will have 5 posts due, each worth 8 points, located on the "reflection posts" tab on the Commons site. These posts are submission-based, meaning if you submit them <u>on time</u>, you will receive full credit, and if you submit the post late you will receive half credit. You will choose to answer one of the three prompts associated with each post- please only answer one prompt and do so in around 200-250 words. To submit your reflection post: Navigate to the "reflection posts" tab on the commons site. Find the corresponding post/prompts entry for that week, click into the post, and scroll to the bottom of the page until you see "leave a reply." To submit, type in the box titled "comment" and click "post comment" to submit.

Quizzes: We will have 4 quizzes, each worth 10 points. Quizzes will be <u>open book</u> and exist to determine your understanding of important vocabulary words used throughout the course. These quizzes will be posted on the Commons site the week they are due.

Group Discussion Leader Presentation: Our in- class group discussion leader assignment/presentation will evaluate your ability to not only comprehend the reading and listening assignments but think critically about the pieces you are reading about and listening to. Your group will create 3 discussion questions for the class based on the reading/listening assignment. Your group will then present on 1 piece of music that relates to the class topic.

Song Analysis Project: You will choose a song of interest to analyze using the elements of music vocabulary and tools discussed in class. This project can take the shape of a PowerPoint presentation, a voice memo, a written analysis, or even a video lecture. The project is due on Friday, February 24, 2023. Final Project (Music and.... Playlist): A playlist of six pieces aligned with a social topic of your choosing (like Music and Feminism, Music and Mourning, etc.) Each piece will feature a written "playlist entry" of about 200-250 words. Your final project proposal will be due on Friday, March 17, and the final project will be due on Wednesday, May 17. Grading Policy: To become comfortable with the language associated with the organization and expression of music, we must create a consistent practice of writing/thinking critically about music. Submission-based grading for the Reflection Posts allows you to explore each topic freely without the pressure of a grade, while traditional grading of quizzes, the song analysis project, and the final allows for constructive feedback.
